About the Fund

With the support of the Department of Housing, Local Government, and Heritage, this fund has been devised to enhance biodiversity in communities throughout the country by combining the expertise of qualified ecologists with the skills, experience, and enthusiasm of local community groups.

We are inviting community groups to apply for a grant to hire an ecologist and develop a Community Biodiversity Action Plan (CBAP) for their local area. A CBAP is a classification of an area's local habitats, an assessment of their condition, an ecological mapping of the area, and a list of actions and recommendations that can be done to enhance local biodiversity.

Sample CBAPs from previous years are available on request.

Criteria

Three levels of grant funding will be offered:

- o **Strand 1:** Grants of up to **€5,500** for community groups to work with an ecologist to classify their local habitats, assess their condition and extent, map them, and define a suite of actions to enhance biodiversity.
- Strand 2: Grants of up to €8,000 for community groups who carry out the work outlined in Strand 1 in collaboration with one or two land managers/owners and particularly farmers, to classify habitats at landscape scale with a focus on field





boundaries (hedgerows, treelines and stone walls), assess their condition and extent, map them and define a suite of actions to enhance biodiversity.

o **Strand 3:** Grants of up to **€11,000** for community groups who carry out the work outlined in Strand 1 in collaboration with three to five land managers/owners and particularly farmers, to classify habitats at landscape scale with a focus on field boundaries (hedgerows, treelines, and stone walls), assess their condition and extent, map them and define a suite of actions to enhance biodiversity.

You must have received permission from all landowners involved before you apply.

Ecologists have agreed to a daily rate for their work of €500 exclusive of VAT, travel and subsistence.

o Groups may work with an ecologist whose name does not appear in the Resource Pack, provided they are suitably qualified and agree to the terms set out in the study criteria. Community Foundation Ireland must be notified in advance if this is the case.

The total cost for the project can be larger than the amount applied for, but Community Foundation Ireland will only fund the amount available through the Strand. Where there are funding gaps, the organisation should note how the additional funds have/will be raised.

Tips on Applying

- Please do not apply for general biodiversity projects as they will not be assessed.
- Attaching a map of your targeted area greatly helps our assessors make an informed decision.
- Please include community outreach/community awareness raising in your budgets. This can include educational events, school talks, public walks/talks with the ecologist, etc.

Priorities for this Strand:

We anticipate that this will be a very competitive grant round so proposals that show the unique value of their project will be prioritised, this includes the following:

- Projects that focus heavily on engaging the wider community and demonstrate an intention and capacity to work closely with local landowners, managers, and particularly farmers.
- Projects which consider biodiversity within towns and villages themselves, alongside their green areas, rivers, farms, and parks. This includes streets, laneways, and buildings where protection and enhancement of biodiversity is often neglected.



- Proposals which aim to raise biodiversity awareness within communities is important through events, murals, biodiversity walks, street art, etc.
- Applications which include a map of their area will be prioritised. This map can be a screenshot from Google Maps, or any other document/picture which shows the area being targeted. Attaching a map is not essential, but applications including one will be prioritised.

Outcomes:

- Please work closely with the ecologist and follow their suggestions. Due to the nature
 of the work there may be delays, or a geographical feature may call for the ecologist
 to bring in another specialist. This can limit the size of the planned area but may be
 more beneficial to local biodiversity.
 - Ecologists have agreed to a daily rate for their work of €500 exclusive of VAT, travel and subsistence.
- It is expected that studies will be carried out by qualified ecologists between January 2024 and Spring 2025, with final CBAPs to be submitted by your group to Community Foundation Ireland by June 2025 and ensuring the ecologist has submitted their data to the National Biodiversity Data Centre.

Reporting requirements:

Successful applicants will be expected to:

- Acknowledge the support of Community Foundation Ireland and The Department of Housing, Local Government and Heritage on any materials associated with the grant.
- Submit a Progress Report in August 2024.
- Submit a second Progress Report in February 2025.
- Submit an Outcome Report along with a copy of their CBAP in June 2025.
- Ensure that data collected from the ecological study is submitted to the National Biodiversity Data Centre by June 2025.

Governance Documents:

When submitting the application, all organisations will be required to upload digital copies of the following governance documents.

1. The Constitution or Memorandum and Articles of Association.

 This must show the mission statement or main objects of the organisation, how any donations will be used and the winding up clause. This must be signed.

2. A bank or credit union account statement header

- This statement header must clearly show the Account Name, BIC and IBAN.
- Please blank out any transactions, as this is purely to verify the account to pay the grant into.
- o If your organisation has a credit union account, you must supply an IBAN for your specific account. We are unable to accept applications without a unique account

3. The organisation's most recent annual accounts

- o Annual accounts should include unabridged financial statements for the year, or where relevant, a monthly profit and loss for the year.
- All applicants must declare their organisation's annual income on the application form, and this will be verified in your most recent annual accounts.
- Organisations with an annual income of **less than €100,000** may provide a Profit and Loss account for the previous year if formal financial accounts are not available.
- o Organisations with an annual income of **more than €100,000** must provide audited annual accounts.
- o Accounts should be from 2021 or 2022 and must be signed.

4. A current list of your organisation's board / committee members and the dates they were appointed.

If you do not submit the correct governance documents, your application will not be considered for funding.
